



Dear Mayor, Council, Commission Members and City Manager,

The **Aquatics and Fitness Expansion** project construction continued. Phase I opened in July. The facility has hosted events such as; SwimJitsu, High School and FoxJets Swim meets and our first indoor triathlon.

Very significant progress was made on the **Miracle League Field**. We appreciate the amount of fundraising work that has happened and the partnership with the Eden Prairie Community Foundation. We expect the field to be ready for play in 2016.

The first permanent **Pickleball Courts** and nets were constructed as a portion of the hardcourt reconstruction at Franlo Park. This allows those who are not familiar with the set-up of pickleball nets to immediately play.

Staff worked with a consultant and the Parks, Recreation and Natural Resource Commission to develop the **Outdoor Center Master Plan**. This document insures that incremental improvements fit with the goals and vision of the overall plan.

The **Mayors Health and Wellness Committee** continued to meet throughout the school year. The committee advised staff on multiple topics and ideas. One of the program areas that kicked off in 2015 was Fitness in the Parks.

Staff continued to participate in **Light Rail Transit** planning and design efforts. Parks and recreation staff continue to focus on station design, place making, connections and public art.

Partnerships with our **Business and Community Organizations** continued to be an important and rewarding part of our jobs. Please see the listing of partners and financial contributors in this report. We look forward to building upon these relationships in the future.

Thank you for your support and confidence. I'm really proud of the work our staff has completed. We look forward to an exciting 2016.

Department Purpose

The Parks and Recreation Department provides a comprehensive parks and recreation program, including park acquisition; planning and development; maintenance of the parks, trails and recreation facilities; forestry; and leisure services programs. These efforts compliment and supplement the leisure services provided by the school districts and other community service organizations.



Partnerships between the City and the community it serves are vital to the success of the Parks and Recreation Department.

The following partnerships are currently in place:

Three Rivers Park District manage Bryant Lake Regional Park, Anderson Lakes Park Reserve, and the LRT trail corridor.

Institution Community Work Crews (ICWC) helped facilitate park projects.

The **Eden Prairie Lion's Club** sponsored two of Eden Prairie's annual special events, Schooner Days and the Corn Feed. Along with enhancing the Hometown Celebration on July 3rd and July 4th by providing beer and bingo.



The **Eden Prairie Historical Society** provided tours of the Dorenkemper house and historic interpretation at the Fall Harvest event.

The Eden Prairie **Noon Rotary** coordinates a RibFest at the Minnesota Festival of Jazz on the Prairie.

Eden Prairie Shopping Center hosted the annual community **Halloween on the Mall** event.

The City maintains a trail easement with **Hennepin Technical College**.

The **Metropolitan Airports Commission** leases the City of

Eden Prairie fifty-five acres of land adjacent to Flying Cloud Airport for youth athletics. The complex includes ballfields, soccer fields and parking. MAC also leases land for the community gardens.

Numerous **Boy Scouts** and **Girl Scouts** community service projects were conducted.

Friends of Birch Island Woods hosted a variety of activities at the conservation area including cleaning up trash and watering planted trees in conservation area.

Metro Resources Unlimited are a group of special needs young adults that performed weekly park maintenance cleaning services from May to September.

e-Quality is an organization that provides adults with developmental disabilities work opportunities. One of the job sites is at the Eden Prairie Community Center.



Adaptive Recreation & Learning Exchange (ARLE), consists of Bloomington, Eden Prairie, Edina, and Richfield, provided a combined brochure to market programs to individuals with disabilities.

MacPhail Center for Music provides private music therapy sessions to individuals with disabilities and adaptive programs.

The **Riley Purgatory Bluff Creek Watershed District** has partnered

with the City to conduct water quality research projects.

Senior Community Services partners with the Senior Center to provide a licensed social worker to support and provide assistance to seniors in Hennepin County, along with providing volunteers to assist with health insurance help.

Eden Prairie Senior Center and **Richfield Senior Center** partner in order to provide monthly coach bus trips and tours through **Medicine Lake Tours**.

Eden Prairie Library provided space for the Senior Center Computer Cracker Barrel class along with partnering on classes for Senior Awareness Month.

Upstream Arts provided a camp for individuals with disabilities with a focus on visual, performing art and poetry.

C.H. Robinson staff volunteer at the Computer Crackerbarrel.

Dunn Brothers provided discounts on beverages and goodies for the Senior Coffee Klatch Group.

Let's Go Fishing – Eden Prairie Chapter partnered with the City to provide free boat rides for Senior in the community.



Southwest Metro Pickleball Club to enhance the senior pickleball program in Eden Prairie.



Glen Lake Golf partners with the city to provide low cost golf lessons and give residents the ability to utilize a high-quality golf facility.

The City of Eden Prairie and the Eden Prairie School District have representatives on the **City and School Facility Use Advisory Committee** to advise the School Board and the City Council on city and school facility usage.



The Parks and Recreation Department and the School District **Community Education** Department worked cooperatively to eliminate duplication of services and programming.

The City of Eden Prairie Park Maintenance and the Eden Prairie School District **Grounds Maintenance** shared specialized maintenance equipment.

The **Eden Prairie High School** used the Community Center for hockey practices and games, swim and diving teams and for physical education classes. The pool is also used by the Track and Cross-Country teams and pole vault practice. City trails are used by High School Track and Cross-

Country teams. The tennis courts, baseball fields and soccer fields are also used by EPHS sport teams and physical education classes.

The Eden Prairie Community Center also provided **Eden Prairie High School** students with parking permits for a fee to park their vehicle in the Community Center parking lot during the school year.

Oak Point pool was used for programming and rentals during non-school time.

Staring Lake Park ski trails were used by the **High School Nordic Team** as a practice facility. The grooming of the trails is done by the ski coach. The public is able to use these trails for recreational skiing.

The Therapeutic Recreation Supervisor received referrals from **School Service Providers** for students with disabilities to get involved in programs.



Prairie View School helps plant and care for the Edible Playground garden during the school year.


Prairie View and Oak Point Schools partnered with the Outdoor Center on environmental learning.

Metro South program offered ESL (English as a Second Language) classes at the Senior Center.

The **Artist Network** is a group of local artists who have partnered with the city to coordinate the annual Eden Prairie Art Crawl in September.

Park Maintenance

The Park Maintenance Division is responsible for the care of the City's 43 parks and special use areas. The 16 full-time employees and 20 seasonal workers maintain over 1,000 acres of developed parkland, including:

- 2 swimming beaches
- 5 fishing piers
- 9 hockey rinks/free skate areas
- 52 baseball/softball fields
- 46 soccer fields
- 12 sand volleyball courts
- 4 bocce courts
- 8 horseshoe pits
- 26 basketball courts
- 4 permanent pickleball courts
- 47 tennis courts; two have overlaid lines for 6 pickleball courts
- 15 football fields
- 7 rental picnic areas
- 3 community garden sites
- off leash dog use areas:
1 year round and 5 seasonal
- lighted sledding hill
- disc golf course
- skate park
- 29 play structures
- 2 splash pads
- over 130 miles of bituminous bike trails



The passive areas of the park system include an additional 1,400 acres of property that is unmaintained or involves minimal maintenance work. Primary duties involve the removal of diseased and hazardous trees, prescribed prairie burns, trail mowing and periodic boundary checks.

Boundary Inspection

The program of checking and marking city parkland boundaries has been going on for 20 years. Since 2008 an electronic method of GPS verification has been used that is permanently recorded in our IT Department GIS Database. Each summer a seasonal staff person systematically checks the entire boundary interface of specific city parkland adjacent to private property. During this process electronic GPS data points of the property pins are collected and then permanent signage is installed. Throughout the city there are over

2,400 private land parcels that abut park property.

During 2015 the boundary inspector worked in 5 different parks or conservation areas. A total of 183 property interfaces were checked, 339 property pins were found, and 309 property posts installed. As a result of their inspection a total of 43 trespass violations were discovered (23% of the properties inspected). After notification most of the violation issues have been resolved with a few remaining that need a follow-up inspection in May of 2016.

Pleasant Hill Cemetery *Established in 1885*

In 1986, the ownership of the cemetery was transferred to the City. 2015 was the 29th year of the City's operation of the cemetery.

The maintenance and operation costs associated with the cemetery are accomplished through a Perpetual Care Fund (PCF). The PCF is entirely separate from the City's General Fund Budget.

The Forestry Division is responsible for the following programs and services: tree disease, tree removal, reforestation, Tree City USA, Arbor Day celebration, augment City natural resource management, City park boundary oversight, and City weed inspection. The division is administered by the Manager of Parks and Natural Resources. Full-time and seasonal employees are used in the activities included within this division.

Throughout 2015, the city received periods of heavier than normal rainfall resulting in a large increase in leaf spot diseases on trees throughout the city. A number of these rain events were accompanied by high wind gusts and many trees or portions of trees were lost due to storm damage.

We were unable to hire a qualified tree inspector for 2015 and relied on full-time staff to carry out inspection activities. Staff discovered 119 elm trees with

Dutch elm disease (DED). This is a decrease from 2014 but most likely can be contributed to fewer hours spent inspecting for tree diseases. 19 Northern red oaks with Oak wilt (OW) disease were also identified during 2015. This is also a decrease from 2014.



Arbor Day Walk and Green Fair

Eden Prairie held the annual Arbor Day Walk at Round Lake Park on May 2nd, 2015 and celebrated its 32nd Tree City USA designation. The program of activities included:

- A tree information table as well as a designated one mile walk around the lake that included tree species information stations for the “Kids Discovery Tree Walk”
- An environmental information table
- Multiple tree related craft activity tables for kids
- An information table about honey bees and hive keeping
- Music by Tricia and the Tunies

Forestry Division Highlights

Forestry Technician responded to 500+ tree related service calls.

7 tree stumps were removed from city parks and street Right-of-Ways.

Tall grass/Weed violation notices sent to 75 properties.

Partnered with “The Friends of Birch Island” volunteer group to coordinate watering and maintenance of the three native tree planting projects in the Birch Island Woods Conservation Area.

Partnered with several groups to do restoration projects including:





Expanding Facility

The Community Center Aquatics and Fitness Expansion project has continued to be unveiled throughout 2015. The new fitness floor was added on to our existing fitness floor, and our third fitness studio, Studio C, came online in May. Studio A, our largest studio, was then expanded upon and all three studios were up and running for the first time together in August. Phase I of the Aquatics Center expansion opened to the public in July, allowing lap swimming, swim team practices and competitions, diving practice and competitions, open swim, and group fitness classes to enjoy the two new bodies of water. Phase II, our zero depth entry pool, is projected to come online in the first quarter of 2016. With all of these additions, our building went from 172,000 square feet after the 2008 renovations, to now having 225,000 square feet.



Membership Conversion

Beginning the last week of July, we began our large scale endeavor of converting our 2400 monthly memberships from our old software system to that of our new software system – RecTrac. Members were asked to come in to confirm their information, get their new picture taken and give us their updated method of payment for their membership dues. Over the course of approximately 3 months we were able to convert all 2400 memberships. A large portion of the memberships needed to be converted manually by our staff and 172 were employee members.




Senior Members

As anticipated, we continue to see a rise in our active older adult members within the facility. We are continuing to meet that demand with increased programming and continued partnership with our Senior Center. Silver Sneakers and Silver and Fit are insurance programs that continue to bring in senior memberships to the facility.

The Eden Prairie Community Center offers members access to a variety of strength and cardiovascular fitness equipment on the Fit Floor and membership also includes access to over 200 group fitness classes each week. For an additional fee members may purchase access to specialty fitness classes such as Yoga and Pilates. These specialty classes provide participants access to fitness classes with highly trained instructors and the program was at 100% cost recovery in 2015.

In March of 2015, a survey was distributed to all Community Center members to gauge members' interest in expanding group fitness offerings to include new and unique classes. A total of 608 individuals responded to the survey. Analysis of the survey responses indicated members desired a high intensity workout that also offered low impact on their joints. In addition responses were favorable to increasing the amount of treadmills to the fitness floor.

Fitness Floor

As part of the phase 1 Aquatics and Fitness Expansion, 32 new pieces of equipment were purchased and installed in the fitness floor and group fitness classes. This included the following pieces of equipment, that rose to the top on the member survey:



Treadmills remain an in demand piece of equipment in the Community Center. In 2015, Community Center Members walked and/or ran on treadmills the equivalent of 6.5 times around the equator.

Group Fitness

Group Fitness Classes remain an important incentive for Community Center membership sales. The member survey focused mainly on member's preference for new group fitness classes. In response to the feedback gained through the member survey the Community Center launched seven new Group Fitness classes in September 2015. These group fitness classes address the need for a high energy low impact workout that was desirable by survey respondents.

Above is a monthly break down of informal attendance records for group fitness studios. Over 109,000 participations in group fitness classes occurred in 2015. In addition to Group Fitness Class offerings in the Group Fitness studios represented above classes were also held in the Gymnasium and dryland training room. Group Fitness Instructors also taught various specialty classes throughout the year for community groups such as Foxjets, Eden Prairie Girls Hockey and the Eden Prairie Fire Department to name a few.

In an effort to increase effective communication with group fitness participants and ease overall management of the group fitness schedule Eden Prairie Community Center began utilizing GroupEX Pro in November 2015. This software allows participants online access to real-time group fitness schedules through a website and on a mobile device through an app. This software also streamlined the process of finding a substitute instructor for fitness staff.

Aquatics


2015 was an exciting year for the Aquatics Department as Phase I of the pool expansion opened in July. Phase I includes two, eight-lane, 25 yard pools, two 1-meter diving boards and a climbing wall.



For the first time since the 1980's the Aquatic Center hosted four EPHS Swim and Dive meets at the facility. Previously the EPHS teams had to compete at separate pools, now they're finally able to compete together at one meet.



Open Fees: Open Swim & Lap Swim



Swimmers competed at one of two meets hosted by Team Foxjet which was a first for the club and brought in area metro swimmers to the new facility. Foxjet Swim Team serves over 250 area youth. Western Wings Special Olympics Swim Team expanded their use of the facility as additional space became available with the expansion.



The two eight-lane pools not only work well for swim meets, but also for specialty events such as SwimJitsu which was a timed race through inflatables in the pool. This event brought 300 participants and spectators from across the state into the new facility.



In addition to the launch of a premier swimming facility the new expansion also includes public art. Behind the stadia seating is an

aquatic themed mural painted by Greg Preslicka.

As a part of Team Foxjet's fundraising initiative support for the aquatics facility the team partnered with the City of Eden Prairie and Mercury Mosaics to create a tile donor wall.



Lake Riley Beach

The beach continues to be a big draw for teens and adults as this well maintained beach is perfect for catching a tan. Lake Riley saw over 11,000 visitors.

Round Lake Beach

The park's splash pad and beach continue to attract young families. Over 11,400 visitors participated in paddle boarding, sand castle building or for just a relaxing day at the park.

The three ice arenas at the Community Center are used for both City recreation programs and facility rentals. The facility is the home ice arena for Eden Prairie High School, Eden Prairie Hockey Association and Eden Prairie Figure Skating Club.

- Over 9,900 hours of ice reserved at the Community Center.
- 5,000 hours were utilized by rental groups
- 4,900 hours were used by city-sponsored programs.
- Over 325,000 patrons attended ice related events at the Community Center.
- EPCC hosted 17 youth hockey tournaments.
- 13 adult hockey/broomball groups that rented over 700 hours of ice.
- Eden Prairie’s Hockey Association rented over 1,950 hours of ice.
- Figure Skating Club rented 760 hours of ice.
- Eden Prairie High School rented over 530 hours of ice for hockey and physical-education classes.



Skating Programs

- City sponsored Learn to Skate lessons are offered throughout the year. There were 1,024 skate lesson participants in 2015.
- Ice skating birthday parties are offered throughout the year. There were over 40 skating birthday parties in 2015.
- Over 5,600 pair of ice skates were rented for skate lessons and open skate.





Ice Show

The Recreation Services Division offers a variety of affordable recreation programs and services for people of all ages and abilities. The staff in this division oversees the programming and management of facilities such as the Art Center, Senior Center, Outdoor Center and several other City park buildings and recreation facilities.

Business Operations

In March, 2015, the department launched the first phase of a new web-based software solution that manages all customer data, registrations, facility rentals and scheduling, concessions sales and Community Center membership management. This fully-integrated system allows customers new search options, and a variety of new features including a family calendar of activities. The system will also allow the Recreation and Community Center staff greater reporting capabilities in order to analyze customer data and monitor trends. At the end of 2015, all modules were fully implemented and all customer information was migrated to the new system.

Addressing Barriers

The Parks and Recreation Department is committed to inclusive programming and to removing barriers to participation. Several new individuals requested and received inclusion services in

2015, and offerings in adaptive recreation programs grew.

The Passport to Fun fee assistance program continued to provide financial scholarships for families in Eden Prairie. In order to maximize access for community members in need of financial assistance, recreation staff worked with PROP (People Reaching Out to People) to strengthen cross-referrals and streamline application processes.

Community Partnerships

The Recreation Division offers a wide range of free community events that provide opportunities for entertainment, education, service, cultural experiences, and overall community building. These community-wide events are made possible through a variety of community partnerships, including local business sponsors as well as service organizations such as the Rotary Club, Lions and Lioness Clubs, and the Optimist Club.

As a service to our community, Parks and Recreation staff members assist local youth-serving organizations in seeking grant opportunities for facility and equipment upgrades.

In 2015, the Eden Prairie Soccer Association was awarded a grant for soccer goals and nets, and the True Friends organization received grant funding for new playground equipment at Camp Edenwood.



Eden Prairie Public Schools continued to be a strong program partner with the Recreation division, with particular focus on environmental education, the arts, programs for older adults, and community gardening.

Program Registration

21,449 online and mail-in/walk-in registrations in 2015.

Youth and Family Recreation provide diverse recreation programs and activities to youth, adults and families in Eden Prairie.

Camps

Preschool Playground Camp was held as a stand-alone camp at Crestwood Park from 9 a.m.–noon Monday–Fridays for 3-5 year olds. The program content was geared toward the younger age range. It was enjoyed by 151 participants. Plans for the summer of 2016 include extending the weeks the program is offered and introducing a “Lunch Bunch” for parents to stay enjoy lunch with their children and meet other parents helping to foster a sense of community to young families. It is the hope to bring in a speaker to offer parenting tips or discussions for the hour long event.

Other programs added to the 2015 summer line up for preschoolers were: **Soccer Shots**, soccer development for youth ages 2-5. **Amazing Athletes** and **Tots camps** which were a variety of sports and active movement camps for preschoolers.

Playground camps maintained enrollment with 1,516 participants in 2014 to the 1,526 participants in 2015. New to the playground camps were Zumba. Once per week at each of the four locations, Prairie View, Homeward Hills, Miller Park and Community Center, youth would participant in a 30-45 minute Zumba routine. Playground Camps ran June 8-August 14, Monday–Friday, 8:30 a.m.–4:30 p.m. at a cost effective price of half days for \$42 or full day for \$75.



Leaders in Training (LIT) for teens ages 13-15 took on a new more effective leadership training curriculum. Teens registered for the June 8–August 14 session working and learning with the LIT Coordinator 8:30–11:30 a.m.

Some of the topics covered during the morning sessions were:

- Leadership Concepts (such as what does leadership mean to me, what does a leader look like, how does a leader sound and act)
- Goal setting/priorities
- Communication and Active Listening
- Job skills – interviewing, resume writing, dressing for success
- Problem solving skills and conflict resolution
- Thinking Creatively
- Choosing Tolerance as a Leader to accept and understand diversity

In the afternoons the youth applied those enhanced skills learning through experiences – (i.e. working at the playground camps, art center camps, outdoor center camps.) The teens also volunteered with Seniors.

Ten youth participated in the program with the hopes that more teens register in 2016 maximizing at 20 youth.


Outdoor Skating Rinks

The outdoor skating rink season started on December 29, 2014 and closed on March 1, 2015. 9,825 people utilized the 9 outdoor facilities including the sledding hill. Fifty staff were hired.



Tennis

Tennis again grew in participation numbers up 293 registrations to 694 in 2015 from 401 in 2014.



Provide innovative recreation programs to individuals with disabilities; as well as inclusion services that foster access and health promotion.



Providing Adaptive & Inclusion Services

In order to provide effective services for Eden Prairie residents and the surrounding communities, we implement:

Inclusion Services

Inclusion is the process in which individuals with disabilities have the opportunity to participate in activities offered to individuals without disabilities. A reasonable accommodation is made to support the participant in the City's programs. The most common accommodation is an extra staff.

Inclusion registrations for 2015 were at 320; equaling 6,776 facilitator staff contact hours.

Fun With Fitness

The Fun with Fitness instructors adapt or modify exercise routines and make them challenging enough for the kids/young adults in the class to receive great exercise. The participants in class get to use the same exercise equipment offered in other classes.

Adaptive Programs

Adaptive programs are designed for individuals with disabilities. The staff to participant ratio is 1:3.

Adaptive registrations for 2015 were at 289; equaling 1,548 instructor contact hours.



Did You Know?

According to the Center for Disease Control, disability affects 1 in 5 people in the U.S. The prevalence of physical inactivity in adults with disabilities is 22% in contrast to 10% of people without disabilities.

Fun with Fitness helps individuals ages 12-22 to be more active. 55 participants attended the year round class.



In support of the City’s mission to foster a high quality living environment and provide, healthy, safe, enjoyable, leisure time opportunities for all segments of the population, Eden Prairie offers a variety of adult athletics programs, from leagues to open recreation.

Adult athletics are open to men and women who want to live an active lifestyle through sport leagues. Leagues take place throughout Eden Prairie parks, school gymnasiums and the Community Center.

Eden Prairie is home to sixteen youth athletic associations offering a variety of activities for area youth ages 5 and above. The Adult Athletics Supervisor works with seven of these associations to schedule outdoor athletic facilities for practices, games, clinics and tournaments.

2015 Accomplishments

Adult Athletics added a completely new staff team! Kori Shingles started in April as the Recreation Supervisor and Steve Brum started in November as the Recreation Lead.

The league module of a new registration software was implemented and 279 teams were registered in the first five months.

Seventy one league schedules were created for over 6,000 participants.

Eden Prairie Soccer Association and Eden Prairie Fastpitch Association each received grant funding for the 2015 Hennepin Youth Sports fall equipment grant cycle.

Various Eden Prairie parks hosted seventeen youth association tournaments.

A collaboration was formed with Hamline University to provide opportunities for sport management students to complete volunteer hours in accordance with their course work. The first volunteer took over 5,000 pictures of adult athletic leagues at night.

In preparation for the 2016 construction of the Round Lake softball fields, the total number of softball teams allowed in the league in 2015 was reduced to lessen the future impact.

Senior Center – Celebrating Vitality in the Community

The mission of the Eden Prairie Senior Center is to *provide* for the social, recreational, educational, psychological and physical needs; and to *enhance* the visibility of older adults and *promote* their participation in all aspects of community life.

Community Partner Award

The City of Eden Prairie and Senior Center received the 2015 Key Community Partner Award from Senior Community Services (SCS). The Senior Center is a partner with many areas of Senior Community Services and continue to work together to bring great services, resources and fun to the residents and surrounding community members of Eden Prairie.



Staying Active

The Senior Center has a well-established ongoing core of weekly, monthly and yearly programming. These programs include cards, game groups, bus rides to go shopping, educational classes, book clubs, coach and van trips, holiday and special events along with health and Live Well education sessions and most of all fun. This year's special events included a Valentine's Brunch, St. Patrick's Day Lunch, cribbage tournament, Volunteer Recognition Lunch, Senior Awareness pie and

entertainment, Spring and Fall Fashion Show, Garden Party, Senior BBQ, Golf Classic, Fall Festival, Veterans Brunch and Holiday Lunch. May is recognized by the City Council as Senior Awareness Month were our community strives to provide seniors with educational opportunities, social gatherings and to provide resources.

21 special events: 1,395 participated

261 classes: 2,897 participated

20 monthly/weekly programs, 14,217 participated

8 active senior clubs/ groups (red hats, woodchucks, book clubs and walking club, pickleball, biking club), 11,351 participated


24 trips were offered via van or coach bus, 453 participated

Rentals

The Senior Center continues to be a great place to rent for parties, classes, religious gatherings and meetings. Both the number of rentals and income increased in 2015. Senior Center and Facilities staff ensure that necessary upgrades and maintenance occur in order to maximize the use of the building.

Room Rental Revenue



Volunteers

Over 90 volunteers spent 4,600 hours in one of many areas including: quilting, greeting cards, bread pick up, program leaders, newsletter labeling, decorating, participant assistant, gardening, game leader, woodshop helper and special events. A Volunteer Recognition Lunch was held in April to honor the work of the Senior Center volunteers.

Senior Advisory Council

The Senior Advisory Council is a group of nine seniors who advised and made recommendations to staff on matters relating to the programs at the Senior Center, and related services for residents of the community. This group meets monthly to discuss current and future programming for the Senior Center. They are dedicated participants and volunteers at the Senior Center.

Woodshop

The Community Woodshop is located at the Senior Center and is open to the entire community. The shop is open during regular business hours of 8:30 a.m. – 4 p.m. and one evening a month. There is a fee to use the woodshop. In 2015 we had 1430 visits to the woodshop. There is an average of about 10-15 users that come a few times per week and a few more that come occasionally. We had 5 new user classes with 15 new people trained to use the shop. The users this year have created pens and bowls using the lathe, cribbage boards, many different style cutting boards, a dining room table and more.

Nature Preschool Program

Children in this program come for half or full days at the Outdoor Center on Thursday and/or Friday during the school year. Overall it was a very successful preschool year, with 74 registrations.

Summer Camps

The Staring Lake Outdoor Center had a total of 348 children come to camp and enjoy a wide variety of nature based camps. We offered a total of 38 different nature themed camps throughout the summer; an increase from the previous year. Camps are still the backbone of the programs offered at the Outdoor Center. We have plans in place to offer more of the “popular” camps for 2016, such as Horse Camp, in hopes of giving more opportunities to attend these favorite programs for the children in Eden Prairie.

Raptor Mew

During the summer of 2014 an Eagle Scout built the wooden shell for a new raptor house which is called a raptor mew. In 2015, the Parks Maintenance staff were able to finish the interior of the raptor mew, install electricity, water, reinforce the screen windows and paint. A security camera was installed inside to monitor a future resident bird. Outdoor Center Supervisor / Naturalist Stan Tekiela attended four days of training at the University of MN Raptor center to learn about the care and management of captive raptors. We are currently on a waiting list to receive a permanently injured raptor to use for education programs.

Adult and Canoe Trips

Once again the adult birding trips were strong in 2015. The one-day canoe trips did not have strong

participation in 2015. The Outdoor Center offered 13 adult trips and canoe adventures with a total of 48 participants.

Holiday Boutique

2015 was the third year of the Holiday Boutique. Ten local artists displayed and sold their handmade crafts. Several of the Senior Center wood shop workers came to sell their products. There were an estimated 200 that attended this unique event. Holiday music was playing, the fireplace was blazing and coffee was offered. A wonderful holiday event.

Nature Rocks

This is our once a month (first Saturday of each month) open house from 9 a.m. to noon. Eden Prairie residents are invited to stop in and tour the facility and learn about the animals that live at the Outdoor Center. We take this time to tell everyone about our other programs such as the Nature Preschool Program and Summer Camps. This is our effort to “sell” our programs to the public and make them aware of our other programs. On average we have about 100 people join us for this free program each month.

Animal Open House

In 2015, we celebrated our 26th year of environmental education with a large event that drew over 500 participants. We had two animal shows including a three-banded Armadillo, Fennec Fox, Hedge Hog, Raccoon and more. We also had on display over 30 different kinds of reptiles from around the world. The weather was good and the event was well-received.



New for 2015

Stemming directly from the new agreement forged in 2014 with Oak Point and Prairie View Schools to provide environmental education to all grades, the Outdoor Center hosted over 1,000 students during 2015.

First graders raised five monarch caterpillars and watched them change into a butterfly. Each butterfly was tagged and released, so that it might be caught again on their wintering grounds in Mexico which would provide us with valuable information on Monarch migration.

Second graders learned about weather and water cycle with our naturalist going to each class doing several experiments including producing a cloud in a bottle.

Third graders studied habitats while the fourth graders completed an in-depth lake quality and water study. Students collected macro-invertebrates and examined them under large microscopes that projected onto a 70" TV screen. They also tested the lake water for clarity, pH and temperature.

The Outdoor Center staff teamed up with the University of MN Fisheries and presented a program on aquatic invasive species, highlighting the ongoing work they are doing to remove the carp from the lake.



Art Center – Fostering Creativity in the Community

The Eden Prairie Art Center is home to a wide array of programs, ranging from classes for toddlers to in-depth programs for experienced adults. Located at 7650 Equitable Drive, the Art Center enhances the quality of life and fosters creativity in our community by providing access to the arts for people of all ages and abilities.



Facilities and Equipment

The Art Center is equipped with a pottery studio with eight wheels (including one handicap-accessible wheel), slab roller, wedging table, hand-building and glazing tables, kilns and storage. There is also a fused glass and jewelry studio, with a fused glass kiln, lampworking

glass bead torches and tolls for fabricating metal jewelry.

Two multi-purpose classrooms spaces house classes in a variety of mediums, including painting, drawing, printmaking and fiber arts.

Programs

Year-round classes are held for community members of all ages, including parent/child classes, youth and teen after-school and summer programs, and classes for adults. Summer is the busiest time, with morning and afternoon youth art camps where kids are painting, drawing, sculpting or making jewelry and pottery. The Center is open whenever programs are running, which is often seven days a week.



The Open Studio program provides access to Art Center facilities and equipment for artists to work on projects independently without instruction. Participation continues to grow, with daytime, evening and weekend options for interested artists.

Many of the teaching artists are available for private lessons, providing customized and

individualized instruction in their medium. Lessons are arranged through the Art Center.



Special Events

Each April, the Art Center holds an Open House, giving community members an opportunity to visit the Center, meet the artists/instructors, enjoy demonstrations and try hands-on activities. In September, the Art Center coordinates and is one of the sites on the Eden Prairie Art Crawl.

Groups

School groups, scouts, and other youth organizations regularly visit the Art Center for special group programs. Art Center birthday parties continue to be a popular choice for families looking for a fun, hands-on experience.



Did You Know?

Professor Semir Zeki, a neurobiologist at the University College London, discovered that simply the act of viewing art gives pleasure, much like falling in love.

Art on City Walls

This program provides rotating artwork displayed at the Art Center and the Senior Center. At various times of the year, residents can view pieces by established artists, emerging artists and student artists of all ages.

In partnership with the Community Services division, Eden Prairie received a grant from MRAC to present the traveling exhibit "Tracks in the Snow." The exhibit, featuring images and stories of the Muslim experience in Minnesota over the past 100 years, was on display at the Eden Prairie Public Library, Senior Center, City Center and Community Center.

Accompanying the display were community engagement activities, including a lunch-and-learn event, family-focused activities, and a panel discussion.

Eden Prairie Community Band

Made up of over 50 local adult musicians, the Eden Prairie Community Band performs regularly across the Twin Cities area. The group rehearses weekly at Central Middle School. In addition to the concert band, Eden Prairie is also home to the Jazz on the Prairie Big Band and the Prairie Ramblers Dixieland combo, as well as other small ensembles.

The Community Band partners with Eden Prairie Public Schools in an annual band festival, provides pit orchestra musicians for the annual Eden Prairie Players summer musical, and their patriotic performance is a highlight of our July 3-4 Hometown Celebration.

The Minnesota Festival of Jazz on the Prairie is an annual day-long festival of big-bands from across the region held at Staring Lake Amphitheater.



Theater

The mission of the Eden Prairie Players is to enhance the quality of life for the community of Eden Prairie through:

- Entertaining and challenging theater experiences for audiences; and,

- Inspiring and nurturing theater opportunities for artists and volunteers.

The 2015 winter production was a classic Agatha Christie murder mystery, *And Then There Were None*. The eleven member cast included seven returning actors and four new to Eden Prairie Players. 2015 saw the return of the EPPIE (Eden Prairie Players Individual Excellence) award. Past co-chairs of the advisory committee and long-time volunteers, Linda Hayen & David Durkee, were recognized for their commitment to Eden Prairie Players.

2015's summer musical, *Once Upon a Mattress*, brought to life the classic fairytale *The Princess & The Pea*. In the most ambitious set design ever, the team built a castle on stage. The creative set design transformed into several locations within the castle. In a change for the

pit orchestra, the musicians were on stage instead of in the grassy "pit" in front of the audience. Unlike some years, in 2015 all seven performances were completed with no hint of rain! The performances were well attended, and the cast featured both new and returning members – with one cast member appearing in his twelfth consecutive summer musical with the Eden Prairie Players.

Children's Theatre Workshop

The 11th annual Children's Theatre Workshop, a reprise of 2007's *Hansel & Gretel*, brought this well-known fairy tale to life at the historic Riley Jacques Barn. Seventeen actors, ages 9 – 15, auditioned, rehearsed and learned basic theatre skills four days a week, over four weeks. This culminated in six public performances, including many younger children sitting right on the carpet in front of the stage.

The workshop is a popular summer tradition in many families, often with siblings participating together.

Collection of One Acts

To celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Collection of One Acts, the group revisited the plays previously performed and selected eight shows that were representative of the "Best of 10 Years." All of the shows received new staging with new directors and actors. Performances were held at the Riley Jacques Barn over two weekends in September, and audience response was very positive. The group added premium seating locations and pricing, with positive feedback to include this element in the future.



Staring Lake Concert Series

From June through early August, the Staring Lake Amphitheater played host to three free concerts a week. The annual kick-off event was the Minnesota Festival of Jazz on the Prairie and Rotary Ribfest, followed by performances each week representing a wide variety of musical styles. Titled “Starring at Staring,” the series included bluegrass, folk, Latin, African, and Caribbean styles as well as tribute bands featuring the music of Johnny Cash, Simon and Garfunkel, and The Beatles. Families are encouraged to picnic in the park, and concessions are available on site.

KidStock

On Tuesday mornings at Staring Lake Amphitheater, it’s all about young audiences. The Kidstock concert series brings interactive performances to the stage, and gets kids singing, dancing and moving. Annual favorites include The Bazillions, the Teddy Bear Band, and the Splatter Sisters.

Art Crawl

The annual Eden Prairie Art Crawl was held September 26-27, with local artists opening their studios for a weekend of demonstrations in a variety of art mediums. Locations are found throughout the community and at the Art Center. New in 2015 was the addition of the Senior Center as a location housing several artists and their work.

Movies in the Park

Families gathered at the park to experience the pre-show entertainment and to get the best spot under the stars. *Big Hero 6*, *The Lego Movie*, and *Annie* (2014) were enjoyed by 250-300 people on the evenings of Friday, August 8, 15, and 22.



Arts in the Park

Arts in the Park was held on Saturday, May 16. 1,000 people attended the event on a beautiful sunny 70 degree day. In addition to the 28 Art Vendors, there was live music entertainment by Paul Renz, Alison Scott, and Michael Monroe; as well as children’s entertainment by the Wonder Weavers, and family yoga.



Hometown Celebration on July 3rd and 4th

The 2-day event was kicked off with food, bingo by the Eden Prairie Lions Club, live music by the Jazz on the Prairie, Community Band, and Martin Zellar. The evening of July 3rd, 800 people gathered to create or continue their family tradition of celebrating Independence Day at Round Lake Park. July 4th was an action-packed day with a pickleball tournament in partnership with the Southwest Pickleball Association, a baseball tournament through the Eden Prairie Baseball Association, high flying BMX demonstrations, a kids beach party with activities and music by Total Entertainment, inflatable fun, a chalk artist, bingo by the Eden Prairie Lions Club, 16 vendors, live music entertainment by Tim Mahoney and Synergy; as well as the best fireworks display in the area.

Fall Harvest Celebration

On Saturday, October 3rd 700 people attended the event on a crisp and sunny 60 degree day. People were enthused to decorate pumpkins, play old-time games while listening to live bluegrass music by the Barley Jacks, tour the Dorenkemper House, and go on a horse drawn wagon ride.



Halloween on the Mall

A partnership with the Eden Prairie Mall, Eden Prairie Police and Fire Departments, the Eden Prairie Crime Fund and the Optimist Club of Eden Prairie provides a safe place for hundreds of children to “trick or treat” at the annual Halloween on the Mall. The event was well-attended by 8,400 people. Music and entertainment was provided by Total Entertainment.

Spooky Saturday

In conjunction with the Community Center team, 15 area businesses and associations came together to offer a fun family Halloween event. Over 1,200 participants trick-or-treated, enjoyed craft activities by the Art Center, use of the Play Structure, creepy critters from the Outdoor Center, a toddler play area, explored Eden Prairie Police and Fire emergency vehicles and played carnival type games.

Rock on Ice

A cold evening only brought out 50 people for Rock on Ice. The event was held at Miller Park in early 2015 to highlight the Ice Castles structure built in the park. Refreshments and DJ with bonfire were offered.

Arbor Day Walk and Green Fair

Eden Prairie held its 35th Arbor Day Walk at Round Lake Park on May 2, 2015. This activity celebrated our 32nd year as a “Tree City USA” designation.

In addition to tree information and free seedings also offered was:

- Environmental information
- Multiple tree related craft activity tables for kids
- An information table about honey bees and hive keeping
- Music by Tricia and the Tunies

Itty Bitty Beach Party

Music and fun was offered to kids ages six and under on Friday mornings at Round Lake Park from mid-June to the end of July.



Fitness In the Parks

Born from the Mayor’s health and wellness initiative in an effort to provide opportunities for all community members to participate in physical activity throughout Eden Prairie the Eden Prairie Group Fitness Staff led free group fitness programs through “Fitness in the Parks” during summer 2015. Through Fitness in the Parks a variety of free programs were offered such as; Family Yoga, Kids Yoga, Paddle Board Yoga, Burn it in 30, Basketball and Kids Zumba.

Class locations included Miller Park, Prairie View Park, Homeward Hills Park, Staring Lake, Riley Park and Purgatory Park. Fitness in the Parks provided free physical activity experiences in nature for approximately 3,850 individuals.

Internal Events

The Parks and Recreation staff work with staff from other departments as part of the Internal Events Planning Committee. This group of employees plan employee events, including:

Park Facility Rental

Many park facilities are operated year-round and are used as warming houses for sledding and skating participants. The eight sites are available for usage all year round for those enjoying ice rinks, playgrounds or just the great outdoors.



In 2015, the park building and amphitheatre rentals through the City of Eden Prairie accrued \$65,138 in fees. Park buildings and facilities are available for Eden Prairie residents for hourly, half day, or full day rentals. Residents host family reunions, wedding receptions and seasonal gatherings at the beautiful park locations in Eden Prairie. The highest grossing park facility for the year 2015 was the always popular Riley-Jacques Barn, which accrued \$17,290.55 in revenue. The barn at the Riley Lake Park is a great location for graduation parties and weddings.

Walks / Runs

The City of Eden Prairie hosted 21 community walk/run events in its parks in the year 2015. The majority of these walk/runs serve as a non-profit fundraising event for local organizations.

Field Rental

Youth athletic associations hosted invitational, regional and state tournaments; and a national tournament for Girls Fastpitch. In 2015, \$34,572 was collected in ballfield and soccer field reservation fees.

Senior Center Room Rentals

The Senior Center had an ongoing every three month contract with:

St. Mary's University for 1-2 nights per week

His Presence Church for Sunday mornings

A bible study group on Wednesday mornings

Community Center Room Rental

The Community Center has eight meeting rooms and two larger conference rooms that are available to rent for residents, non-residents, businesses, organizations, and associations. The rates for these rooms range from \$10 to \$65 an hour with a 2-hour minimum rental required. In 2015, the Community Center generated \$50,815.32 in room rental revenue. Each week the Community Center hosts routine, ongoing rentals and welcomes new rental patrons. Rental usage at the Community Center ranges from board meetings and conferences to birthday parties and baby showers. Due to construction accommodations from the Aquatics Center expansion, renters and patrons have been flexible with making adjustments to fitness class and room reservation changes.

Other areas available for rent in the Community Center are ice rinks, the pool, and gym space.


Ice Rink Rental

There were over 5,000 hours rented for hockey and figure skating. Eden Prairie Hockey Association, Figure Skating Club, High School and Ice Edge AAA continue to be our largest user groups.

Pool Rental
