# Singletree Lane Improvements

s summer approaches, the City of Eden Prairie is preparing to break ground on a reconstruction project along Singletree Lane, near the intersection of Flying Cloud Drive. Planned improvements will reconstruct Singletree Lane into a four-lane divided roadway, with left turn lanes located between Flying Cloud Drive and Eden Road. The project will also include a new traffic signal at the Flying Cloud Drive intersection, as well as new pedestrian facilities and streetscape enhancements along Singletree Lane.

Construction on the project is expected to start in late May and is scheduled to be substantially complete by the end of July. During this construction period motorists should be advised of the following traffic conditions, which are necessary for the reconstruction of the Singletree Lane and will be limited to 60 calendar days:

Singletree Lane will be closed between Flying Cloud Drive and Glen Lane.

In order to maintain access to Glen Lane businesses, two-way traffic will be maintained on Singletree Lane between Glen Lane and Eden Road. Motorists should use Eden Road for access between Flying Cloud Drive and Singletree Lane.

The Flying Cloud Drive-Singletree Lane traffic signal will be temporarily taken out of operation.

During this time, the intersection will be uncontrolled for motorists on Flying Cloud Drive, with no access to Singletree Lane.

Access to Eden Prairie Center at Singletree Lane will be temporarily converted to a right turn in and right turn out only operation. Full access to Eden Prairie Center at Regional Center Road will be maintained throughout construction.

Motorists should also be advised that, although construction will be substantially complete by the end of July, additional construction activities will likely take place through the end of September; however, these additional construction activities should have minimal traffic impacts.



## Around Eden Prairie A Page from the Blog of City Manager Scott Neal

e are wrapping up our first year of operating the Eden Prairie Art Center. As we wrap up Year 1, the numbers are in on the revenue performance of the Art Center, and the numbers look good.

Our 2009 Art Center budget projected total revenue for the Art Center of \$36,000. Our actual revenue for the year was \$80,000. Of that \$30,000 in projected total revenue, \$30,000 was projected to come from class and program fees. Our actual class and program revenues were \$33,700. Our 2009 total revenues also included \$2,000 in membership revenue; an \$8,500 grant from the Eden Prairie Foundation; and \$36,000 in cash gifts from other patrons, including the Sampson Family who gave us the Art Center building in the first place.

2010 numbers and participation rates are also off to a good start. One of the key operational metrics in the parks & recreation world is to track what happens on the first day of registration for the new program year. For example, in 2009 there were 45 registrations for Art Center programs on the first day of registration for 2009 spring/summer

> programs. In 2010, there were 100. In 2009, Day 1 registrations accounted for just under \$4,000 of revenue. In 2010, Day 1 registrations produced just under \$8,000 in program revenue. I'm not sure that doubling our participation and revenue every year is a sustainable trend, but we sure would like

to do it for the short term future. That would be good. If you are not familiar with the Eden Prairie Art Center, come over and visit during the Open House celebrating its first year anniversary on Sunday, May 23 at the

Art Center from 2-4 pm. The Eden Prairie Art Center is located at 7650 Equitable Drive. If you're interested in more information about the Art Center, visit edenprairie.org/artcenter.

Garage sales are an economical and environmentally friendly way to rid your household of items you no longer need; however, it is important to keep safety in mind when inviting strangers to your home.

The Eden Prairie **Police Department** recommends the following safety measures when hosting a garage sale:

- Keep a cell or cordless phone with you at all times.
- Close and lock all windows and entrances to your home.
- Never allow strangers to enter your home, for any reason.
- Set up your cash box in a highly visible location outside the garage. • Never leave your cash box unattended, even if it is locked.
- Arrange hanging sale items and tables so they do not obstruct your view of the sale area.
- Don't place items right next to the road where they could be easily stolen.
- While making change, always keep the money handed to you in plain view.
- Never use your full street address in sale ads, use the block or intersection instead.

## **Our Environment**

Infiltration and Rain Gardens



he U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has named storm water runoff, rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground, as our nation's biggest water quality threat.

Runoff occurs when impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks and streets prevent storm water from naturally soaking into the ground. This causes debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants to flow into storm sewer systems which lead directly into lakes, streams, rivers and wetlands. All storm water runoff that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into bodies of water used for swimming, fishing and sources for drinking water.

The best way to help storm water infiltrate the ground rather than run off into storm sewers is to create a rain garden or infiltration area designed to catch rain water runoff with vegetation that can tolerate partial flooding on occasion. Rain gardens provide beautiful landscaping, create a natural wildlife habitat and, by soaking up rain where it falls, they slow storm water runoff, help prevent erosion and remove pollutants in the process.

The City of Eden Prairie is partnering with the Lower Minnesota River Watershed District and Metro Blooms to host a rain garden workshop:

Tuesday, May 25

6-9 p.m.

Eden Prairie City Center - Heritage Room

Cost: \$10 per household

This three-hour workshop will provide an overview of rain gardens, plus assistance from landscape design assistants and master gardeners in planning a rain garden, including plant selection.
