

## CodeRED

Your Contact Information is Needed!

Emergency preparedness officials for the City of Eden Prairie are in need of assistance from residents and businesses in order to effectively deploy the new CodeRED emergency notification system.

The implementation of this new system will provide the City of Eden Prairie with a high speed telephone calling system capable of delivering customized pre-recorded emergency messages directly to homes and businesses.

Currently, the CodeRED notification system includes all fixed telephone lines within the City of Eden Prairie; however, residents and businesses are encouraged to confirm the accuracy of information within the system, as well as add additional information such as cell phone and work numbers, as well as alternate emergency contact information.

To update your information in the CodeRED emergency notification system:

1. Visit [edenprairie.org](http://edenprairie.org).
2. Click on the CodeRED link.
3. Enter your home telephone number.
4. If you do not have a fixed telephone line, enter the main telephone number where you can be reached.
5. Follow the instructions for updating or creating your account.

When verifying your account information be sure to provide as much information as possible; remember to save your username and password; and keep your current contact information updated within the system.

The City will run a test of the CodeRED system in late December, this test alert will serve as a reminder and a verification of your contact information.

### Volunteer

PROP is staffed almost entirely by volunteers. Many volunteers are currently needed to work in the food shelf, office, transport and for special projects. Most volunteer work is done on-site, weekday mornings and Wednesday evenings. Some work on special projects or seasonal programs is done off-site.

Volunteer Opportunities include:

**Food Shelf** – receive, weigh, sort and stock donated food, prepare food orders for clients.

**Office Staff** – answer phones, assist clients with paperwork, record keeping and general office duties.

**Grocery Shopper** – purchase needed grocery items at local grocery stores.

**Transport** – occasional transport of food, clothing and furniture.

**Computer Staff** – maintain client database, type correspondence and prepare mailings.

**Special Projects Coordinator** – assist with coordination of seasonal programs (Gardening, School Supplies, Thanksgiving Food and Holiday Gifts).

**Seasonal Projects** – assist with the collection and distribution of donations for seasonal programs (Gardening, School Supplies, Thanksgiving Food and Holiday Gifts).

**Ambassador** – generate support and donations by linking with other organizations and businesses in the community.

## Spotlight on City Staff

The City of Eden Prairie boasts nearly 10,000 acres of land designated for parkland and open spaces. Wes Dunsmore, park maintenance supervisor, is charged with the annual upkeep of Eden Prairie parkland. Having worked for the City since Jan. 1, 1972, he is currently the longest tenured employee in Eden Prairie and has committed the last 37 years to ensuring that this community maintains a quality park system for the enjoyment of residents and visitors of all ages.

### Meet the City's Park Maintenance Supervisor!

**Name:** Wes Dunsmore

**Year you joined the City:** 1972, one year before Eden Prairie had its own Police Department.

**Current position:** Park Maintenance Supervisor

**Brief description of what you do:** My position oversees the maintenance that goes on in the parks throughout the year. This includes such things as mowing, fertilizing and maintaining ball fields, soccer fields, lacrosse fields, dog parks, beaches, etc. We also do ice rink maintenance and assist Public Works with snow removal. Just about everything that is in our parks is our responsibility to maintain, remove or replace.

**What would you like residents to know?** I would like the residents to know that all of our employees in the Parks Division are highly motivated, caring, professional and dedicated. I truly believe our employees want to do their best and deliver a quality product or service, not just some of the time but rather all of the time. These people chose this career because of their passion for this work; it's something they love to do.

**What do you like best about working for the City?** Several things come to mind: having a variety of work, being outside (yes even in the winter), dealing with residents with their concerns and helping them come to a resolution. Knowing that what you do does make a big impact on people's lives, whether you're plowing snow or clearing streets of downed trees after a storm.

**What is something interesting, unique or little-known about you?** I have been in 22 states on my motorcycle and several national parks including: Yellowstone, Rocky Mountain, Blue Ridge, Mesa Verde, Arches National Park and more. One interesting road trip is called the Great River Road Ride where you follow the Mississippi River from the mouth of the river to New Orleans, my wife, Carol, and I followed it from Red Wing to New Orleans. I really enjoy these trips, especially when taking some back roads you get an opportunity to see the real Americana, meet some interesting characters, realize how lucky we are to be in the U.S.A. and most importantly that life is good.

I am the first full-time parks employee hired by the City in the Maintenance Division and now there are 18 full-time employees. When I started the population of Eden Prairie was 6,000 plus, and now it's 60,000 plus, so there have been a few changes since I started.

## 20-40-15 Update


In September 2009, the Eden Prairie City Council approved the plan to move forward with Phase Three of the City's 20-40-15 initiative. This program, aimed at improving energy efficiency in City facilities by 20 percent, improving the fuel efficiency of the City's vehicle fleet by 40 percent and achieving these goals by the year 2015, is being completed in a series of phases, the second of which was finished in the fall of 2009.

Phase Three, which the City will complete in 2010, includes the following changes and improvements:

- Installing a new, more efficient energy management system which would control all heating, ventilating and air conditioning units as well as most of the interior lighting at the City Center.
- Modifying the ice rink dehumidifier at the Community Center to make it more energy efficient.
- Replacing three major pieces of cooling equipment at the City Center with more energy efficient units.
- Replacing parking lot lights at four City parks with energy-efficient LED lighting.

To accomplish the goals set forth in the 20-40-15 initiative, the City is working closely with McKinstry Company, a firm touted by President Barack Obama as a "model for the nation" for their work in retrofitting schools and office buildings throughout the country to make them more energy efficient.

The City's partnership with McKinstry Company guarantees the estimated savings from the projects it recommends will pay for the cost of implementing those projects as well as the firm's consulting fees. If the savings fall short of the costs the City incurs, McKinstry Company will make up the difference. It's a win-win arrangement for the City and its taxpayers.





As we turn the page at the end of each year I like to take a moment to look back on where I've been and what I've done. I believe it's important to do that as a city government as well. Eden Prairie city government is the steward of the City's public buildings, parks, streets and much of its natural open space.

We are also the stewards of Eden Prairie's image and future. We want to be accountable to you — the residents and taxpayers of Eden Prairie — because we take our stewardship responsibility very seriously, and because there's a lot to be proud of in Eden Prairie from 2009.

We improved the City's outstanding network of parks, recreational facilities and natural open spaces by completing the second phase of a barrier-free playground at Miller Park, renovating Staring Lake Amphitheatre, and opening the new Round Lake Baseball Stadium and new Art Center facility.

We enhanced public safety within the City by adding Fire Engine 11 to our fleet of emergency response vehicles, and by upgrading our Emergency Dispatch and Radio System. In addition, we launched a Police Department blog on the City's Web site, three of our 911 dispatchers received an award from the Minnesota Chapter of the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials for their efforts during the rescue of a man trapped in a trench, and we supported Special Olympics of Minnesota with the second annual Polar Bear Plunge at Round Lake Park.

We completed phase two and started phase three of the City's 20-40-15 initiative aimed at increasing the energy efficiency of our public buildings by 20 percent, the energy efficiency of our vehicle fleet by 40 percent and to accomplish both of those goals by 2015.

We dedicated significant time again this year to planning for big changes in the future of Eden Prairie by participating in the process to extend Light Rail Transit to Eden Prairie; by finalizing the City's Comprehensive Plan; and by completing several new development projects, including Windsor Plaza, that will strengthen the economic vitality of Eden Prairie's retail business center.

We completed a relocation and renovation project at the Eden Prairie Liquor store near Kowalski's Market, further enhancing this unique source of revenue for the City.

We welcomed returning Council Members Brad Aho and Ron Case to the 2009 City Council.

In addition to all of our accomplishments, the Quality of Life Survey, which was conducted in December 2008, indicated that 98 percent of residents rate the quality of life in Eden Prairie as good or excellent — I am extremely proud of that rating. On behalf of your elected officials and everyone who works for the City of Eden Prairie, we thank our residents and taxpayers for the opportunity serve you.

## Our Environment

Go Green, One Room at a Time



Sometimes, the task of going green seems overwhelming. This year, start small and go green one room at a time!

Here are five ways to green up your living space, one room at a time:

### 1. Minimize Your Energy Use

Using less energy at home not only saves you money, but helps to reduce your overall impact on the environment. Consider resisting the urge to crank up the heat; for every degree below 68 degrees on your thermostat, you can save 3 to 5 percent on heating energy.

### 2. Add a Household Plant

Decorating with live plants offers many benefits to you and your environment. In addition to adding a welcoming touch, live plants can help clean the air, reduce noise pollution and even have proven health benefits. Plus, for those who have a hard time staying indoors for the long winter, decorating with a few house plants is an ideal way to bring nature to you.



### 3. Green Your Appliances and Electronics

The use of energy-saving appliance models can make a big difference to the environment and your wallet. To make sure you're using the most eco-friendly versions, the EPA recommends replacing household appliances with energy-saving counterparts that showcase the ENERGY STAR logo. In addition to appliances, ENERGY STAR also certifies home electronics, office equipment and lighting fixtures for your home or office space. Some of these products can even qualify you for a rebate or sales tax exemption.

### 4. Minimize Your Clutter

Reducing the clutter in your living space will make it more efficient in a multitude of ways. As you locate the stuff that you can live without, instead of hauling it to a local dump, check which items are recyclable and which ones you can pass on. For items that others can use, consider donating them to your favorite charity or passing them along to someone else who could use them.

### 5. Shine Energy-Efficient Light

According to ENERGY STAR, a compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulb uses 75-percent less energy than a traditional light bulb and lasts 10 times longer. # Around Eden Prairie

A Page from the Blog of City Manager Scott Neal

I've written many times about the City's efforts to get improvements made at the interchange of I-494 and Hwy. 169. The current situation, with multiple traffic signals, leaves a lot to be desired. It congests traffic, frustrates drivers and can create traffic safety problems.

The big problem, of course, has always been money. Constructing a full long-term solution to this interchange was estimated by the MnDOT to cost around \$180,000,000. However, earlier this year MnDOT and the cities of Eden Prairie, Edina and Bloomington reached an agreement to support a project that was reduced in scope that was estimated to cost \$140,000,000. The problem with the compromise solution was that the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) did not support the reduced project scope. They continued to support the full project and said they would not contribute any federal dollars toward any project at 494-169 that did not include the full long-term solution.

That was a problem – until earlier this week.

Earlier this week the FHWA announced that they changed their mind. They will support the reduced scope project at 494-169 as a "demonstration project." This is a big deal. The project can now move forward through the federal government's TIGER grant program which is a competitive federal grant program for significant national transportation projects, like the 494-169

project. If the feds did not support the reduced scope project, well then our project wouldn't have much of a chance of getting federal grant dollars. The fact that the feds now support the reduced scope project doesn't guarantee TIGER grant dollars for the project, but it does put the project in the mix, which is really the best we can hope for at this time.

Working on this initiative has been a good exercise for our city. Our City Council, Mayor Young and Council Member Brad Aho in particular, have been working hard behind the scenes with their peers in Edina, Bloomington and Scott County to push the advocacy efforts for the project at the state and federal level. State Representative Jenifer Loon (R-42B) has also devoted a lot of time and energy to working with MnDOT and federal officials to help bring them along to their change of heart. And I'd be remiss if I did not point out the fine work of our Economic Development Manager David Lindahl. David always kept this issue in the

forefront. He did a lot of little things to keep people thinking and talking about solving the 494-169 problem.

We're not done yet. This is a notable event, but it doesn't mean any federal money is on the way yet. We'll keep working on this until it's done.
