# Homeowners Can Save Money and Resources

If you could make one decision that would help protect the environment, save you money and even put a little extra cash in your pocket, would you do it?

Now is the time for Eden Prairie homeowners to learn more about the tax credits and rebates available from the federal government and local utility companies, and begin making energyefficient improvements.

## **Federal Income Tax Credits**

The federal tax credit for energy-efficient home improvements was extended and expanded by The Energy Improvement and Extension Act of 2008 and The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. The credit now applies to eligible equipment purchased between Jan. 1, 2009, and Dec. 31, 2010.

The credit is applicable for energy-efficiency improvements in the building envelope of existing homes and for the purchase of high-efficiency heating, cooling and water-heating equipment. Efficiency improvements or equipment must serve a dwelling in the United States that is owned and used by the taxpayer as a primary residence. The maximum amount of homeowner credit for all improvements combined is \$1,500 for equipment purchased during the two-year period of 2009 and 2010.

### **Building Envelope Improvements**

Owners of existing homes receive a tax credit worth 30 percent of the cost of upgrading the efficiency of the building's envelope. Installation (labor) costs are not included. The following improvements are eligible for the tax credit:

- · Insulation materials and systems designed to reduce a home's heat loss or gain
- Exterior doors and windows (including skylights)
- Pigmented metal roofs designed to reduce heat gain, and asphalt roofs with appropriate cooling granules

## **Heating, Cooling and Water-Heating Equipment**

Taxpayers who purchase qualified residential energyefficient products are eligible for a tax credit worth 30 percent of the system cost, including labor costs. The credit may also be applied to labor costs for assembly and original installation of eligible products. The following types of equipment are eligible:



- Electric heat pump water heaters
- Electric heat pumps
- Central air conditioners
- Natural gas, propane or oil water heaters
- Natural gas, propane or oil furnace or hot water boilers
- Advanced main air circulating fans
- Biomass stoves that use "plant-derived fuel available on a renewable or recurring basis, including agricultural crops and trees, wood and wood waste and residues (including wood pellets), plants (including aquatic plants), grasses, residues, and fibers'

Performance and quality standards for tax credit eligibility vary by technology, visit energystar.gov/taxcredits for detailed information on qualifying products.



## **Xcel Energy Rebates**

Xcel Energy offers rebates to its Minnesota residential customers for the purchase of energy-efficient heating and cooling systems: water heaters, furnaces, boilers, heat pumps and air conditioners. Rebate amounts vary from \$30 to \$330 depending on equipment and efficiency.

Xcel Energy also offers the residential Saver's Switch program, offering residents a bill credit during the summer months in exchange for agreeing to have their air conditioning systems cycled on and off during peak energy demand periods.

In addition, residential customers may also qualify for the Home Performance Rebate program. In order to participate in this program, participants must be both natural gas and electric Minnesota residential customers. Customers receive a reduced priced energy audit, and then implement at least five energy-efficiency improvements—three mandatory and two optional. Rebates range from \$10 to \$330 depending on the improvements made.

# **Saving Tax Dollars** One Idea at a Time

n Eden Prairie, City staff members take pride in being good stewards of taxpayer dollars and, in these difficult economic times, City employees are stepping up to the plate with new and innovative ways to spend wisely, save money and protect the environment, while continuing to provide quality service to Eden Prairie residents and businesses.

# **Electronic Paycheck Stubs**

Several months ago, a City of Eden Prairie employee suggested the City "go green" by eliminating bi-weekly printed paycheck stubs, an idea that was implemented in April 2009. This simple change will save more than 8,000 envelopes and 8,000 sheets of paper each year, an environmentally conscious choice that will also save tax dollars.

### **Artificial Greenery**

Another employee suggestion initiated the City's recent choice to reduce the amount of live greenery maintained inside City facilities, and replace remaining greenery with artificial alternatives. This change provides the same welcoming ambiance, while reducing the cost of plant maintenance services.

# **Low-Maintenance Landscaping**



When the possibility of saving water and maintenance costs associated landscaping at City facilities was identified, City staff members developed a low-maintenance landscaping plan

which was recently implemented around the City Center. By allowing natural grasses to grow and utilizing rock landscaping in areas where grass was previously watered and maintained, the City is able to reduce maintenance expenses and water use.

# Our Environment

Electronics and Data Security Recycling

he United States currently dumps between 300 million and 400 million electronic items per year, which amount to approximately 70 percent of the toxic waste in our nation's landfills.

Flat panel computer monitors and laptop screens often contain small amounts of mercury in the bulbs used to light them. Cathode ray tubes in older computer monitors typically contain anywhere from four to seven pounds of lead. For this reason, Minnesota law now

requires consumers to recycle all video display devices.

On Saturday, Nov. 14 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., renovodata services will provide a one-day collection and recycling event at the Eden Prairie Education Center (8040 Mitchell Road). This event is a great opportunity to safely dispose of video display devices and electronic devices which hold

Items accepted at this collection include: computers (including monitor, keyboard and mouse), printers, laptops, computer hard drives, personal data devices or cell phones, and flash drives. The recycling fee for most items is \$10 each.

In order to safely remove personal information, renovodata services will have an on-site mobile data shredder, for secure data removal and certified data destruction.

# Did You Know?

id you know that Minnesota state law requires carbon monoxide (CO) detectors in all homes? Carbon Monoxide is odorless and colorless, and the symptoms of CO poisoning can be difficult to distinguish from the common cold or flu. If left undetected, high levels of carbon monoxide in the home can lead to severe illness or even death.



Although all tested and approved CO detectors are sufficient for detecting carbon monoxide, there are some key elements to look for when buying one. Some detectors are more sensitive to carbon monoxide than others, meaning they will detect lower levels of the toxin than other less sensitive units.

# **CO Detector Tips:**

- Always choose a CO detector that has been tested
- If you want a detector that monitors low levels of carbon monoxide, look for one that has a
- If you are not diligent about checking and replacing batteries, a battery-operated CO detector is not right for you. Although they allow for more flexible placement, a plug-in version may be best.
- Never plug a CO detector into an outlet that is controlled by a switch.
- Test your CO detector once a week by pushing the device's test/reset button.
- Replace your CO detector every five years, unless the manufacturer recommends sooner.

Finally, be sure that all members of your household know that if the alarm sounds on a CO detector, they should evacuate the home immediately and call 911 for assistance. Always leave it to the professionals to determine the source of the carbon monoxide.




