



Juvenile Diversion Program Provides Options To Youth

has implemented a new Juvenile Diversion program designed to work with juvenile offenders. Eden Prairie Police Sergeant Randy Thompson is heading up the effort, after spending the last 14 years as School Liaison.

Currently, juvenile offenders are referred to Hennepin County Juvenile Court where a juvenile referee presides over the case and a disposition is determined. Often this process takes months and the disposition is not fitting of the offense. In many cases, the victim of the offense is not involved in the outcome.



The new program hopes to change these two factors. To place a case into diversion, several requirements must be met. First, the victim must be willing to take part in, or allow the diversion program to commence. "If a victim says 'I want her prosecuted,'

he Eden Prairie Police Department we'll do that by sending the case to juvenile court," said Thompson. Second, the police must believe the child can successfully complete the program. Thompson says, "The more serious the offense or if there's been a pattern of law breaking, the less willing we will be to have that child in the program."

> Already this diversion program's Family conferencing component has been used in a couple of situations. A family conference brings the victim, victim supporters, the juvenile offender, and the offender's family together to discuss ways to repair the harm that was caused. These face to face meetings are designed to focus on the offender's actions and how the harm of those actions can be repaired.

> "In many cases, a combination of written apology, restitution and community service will become part of a contract whereby the offenders work to repair the harm they have caused," Thompson said. When the child has completed the program, the Eden Prairie Police will have documentation of the offense and diversion; however, there will not be a criminal record with Hennepin County.

> Thompson is excited about the potential positive outcomes from this program for Eden Prairie youth and believes it can be a great tool to reduce repeat offenders.



Give Back to the Community - Be a Police Reservist

t's the childhood dream of many little boys and girls - to be a police officer. Though many of those individuals eventually follow other career pursuits, there are still opportunities to have involvement in the Police Department. One of those opportunities entails becoming a Police Reserve Officer.

> for nearly 30 years in Eden Prairie and currently, the City has 23 police reserve officers. Eden Prairie police reservists are volunteers who assist licensed, officers in a number of situations including severe weather conditions, fire scene protection, lost/missing person searches, crime scene protection, serious traffic accidents, power outages or special projects. They also manage traffic

many special events. Other responsibilities of police reserve officers include activation of the Mobile Command Center and working regularly scheduled patrol shifts. New reservists undergo a training program one night per week for ten

weeks and take a CPR/First Aid training course to prepare for service. After these credentials have been met, reservists must work at least one weekend evening per month, attend monthly training meetings, carry a pager and respond when available to emergency calls. t was July of 1981 that a group of Eden Prairie citizens and business leaders announced the formation of the Prairie

Foundation. The original Board of Directors was made up of 12 members who knew that Eden Prairie would face new responsibilities and challenges as the city grew.

This March, when the Eden Prairie Foundation Ball is held at the Minnetonka Marriot, it will mark both the 25th year of the foundation and the 25th year of its major fundraiser, the Ball. The first Ball raised a little more than \$10,000. In 2005 the Ball raised more than ten times that much and the goal for 2006 is \$125,000.

In its 25 years the Eden Prairie Foundation has been able to contribute nearly \$800,000 to community projects. Roy Terwilliger of Community

Bank Group has been involved with the Foundation since its beginning. "The original idea was pretty simple" said Terwilliger, "provide a way to raise monies for community projects that could not be funded through tax dollars." He went on to say, "The Foundation's work has enhanced the community in many ways, providing for things that while perhaps not necessary, make Eden Prairie a better place to live and work."

For the past two and a half years Phil Young has represented the City of Eden Prairie on the Foundation Board and is grateful for the group's efforts. "This is a great organization. It's made up of all volunteers whose sole purpose is to give back to our community and they give a lot."

As a result of the many thousands of hours the hundreds of volunteers have contributed over the past two and a half decades, the Eden Prairie Foundation has become an integral part of the Eden Prairie community.







commissions are looking right now for good people willing to donate their time and expertise to better the community. Two of the commissions are brand new and will need to have all positions filled so get ready to get involved! Applications will be accepted in January, City Council will conduct interviews in February and appointments will be made in March. Commission terms are typically three years long and start on April 1. You can also call Michael Barone at 952-949-8433. All commission meetings are open to the public if you'd like to check them out in person. The seven commissions are featured below.



Arts and Culture Commission

The Arts and Culture Commission is an advisory board for the City Council. The group deals with matters that pertain to cultural performance and visual arts programs as well as activities supported by the general public. The goal of the group is to build awareness for the Arts in Eden Prairie. It does so through programs like Art on City Walls, the Community Band and Eden Prairie Players Community Theater group. Commission meetings are held the second Monday of each month at 7 p.m. at Eden Prairie City Center.



Planning Commission

The Planning Commission is the front line for all information about projects and development in the community. The commission carefully wades through proposals to determine the viability of a plan, whether it fits in aesthetically, and the land use issues surrounding it. Decisions are made with regard to the City's Strategic Plan, Comprehensive Guide Plan and City land use. Information is passed on to City Council members who have the ultimate decision making power. Meetings are held on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 7 p.m. in the Council Chambers.



Human Rights & Diversity Commission

The Human Rights and Diversity Commission acts in an advisory capacity to the city on matters of diversity, civil and human rights and the Americans with Disabilities Act. The commission has been involved in everything from finding solutions to "bullying" in our schools to helping immigrants with assimilating into our community. Each year it is responsible for handing out two types of awards. The Dr. Jean L. Harris Youth Scholarship Award goes to one or two high school seniors who show the importance of an inclusive community through volunteering. The Human Rights Awards are given to an individual, non-profit or business who demonstrates the importance of diversity and inclusiveness through programs or actions. Commission meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. on the lower level of the Eden Prairie Mall.



Conservation Commission

The new conservation commission will act in an advisory capacity to the City Council. The goal is to advance and support the health and development of the citizens and natural environment of Eden Prairie. The commission will accomplish that by examining and recommending the best practices for energy conservation. It will establish a 'Green' Building code and even promote a healthy community by encouraging a community designed for walking, exercise and recreation. The commission will meet monthly, but the exact night has not yet been set.



Heritage Preservation Commission

The Heritage Preservation Commission promotes Eden Prairie's future by protecting its past. The group works to safeguard sites and structures that reflect significant elements of the City's cultural, social, economic, political, visual or architectural history. It promotes the preservation and continued use of historic sites and structures for the education and general welfare of the people of the City. Commission meetings are held on the third Monday of each month at 7 p.m. at Eden Prairie City Center.



Flying Cloud Airport Advisory Commission

The new Flying Cloud Airport Advisory Commission is being formed to advise the City Council and the Metropolitan Airports Commission on matters affecting the operation of Flying Cloud Airport. The Commission will monitor the implementation of the Final Agreement between the City of Eden Prairie and the Metropolitan Airports Commission as well as noise abatement methods to reduce aircraft noise in the community. The commission will also work cooperatively with MAC staff in reviewing the use and control of Flying Cloud Airport.



Parks, Recreation & Natural Resources Commission

Eden Prairie is known for its abundance of natural resources. The lakes, trails and parks residents enjoy are the envy of many other communities and it just keeps getting better. The Parks, Recreation and Natural Resources Commission advises the City on issues concerning development and use of parks and recreation facilities, leisure services, recreation programming, preservation of natural resources and promotion of environmental awareness. Meetings are held on the first Monday of every month at 7 p.m. at Eden Prairie City Center.
