2017 Annual Report

I am pleased to submit the 2017 Eden Prairie Police Department Annual Report to you and the residents of Eden Prairie. This report contains a summary of the events and operations the Police Department undertook in 2017.

In personnel, Lt. Jim Morrow retired at the end of September and Matt Sackett was promoted to fill the open lieutenant position. Ron Henke was promoted to fill the open sergeant position. With Sgt. Pete Vosbeek's impending January 2018 retirement, Rob Johnston was promoted to sergeant in November to begin sergeant field training. In addition, the department hired six new officers to accommodate retirements.

Unfortunately our community saw three homicides in 2017, which are discussed in more detail on page 11. We also had one traffic fatality which occurred in September when a man on a motorcycle died in a single vehicle crash on the Hennepin Technical College campus.

Opioid overdoses increased 425 percent from 2016 to 2017. We are continuing to work on prevention, education and enforcement in the community to bring that number down in 2018. More information on last year's opioid overdoses can be found on page 11.

Residential burglaries were down slightly in 2017, while thefts from vehicles increased approximately 50 percent. Identity theft reports nearly doubled from 2016 to 2017. We will continue to educate our residents on how not to become victims of these crimes. A more detailed table of 2017 statistics can be found on page 21 of this report.

On behalf of the nearly 150 staff and volunteer members of the Police Department, I thank you for your continued support and look forward to serving you in the coming year.

Matt Sackett was promoted to lieutenant Sept. 30, 2017. Lt. Sackett was hired by the EPPD in 2002 and during his tenure has worked as a Patrol Officer, Patrol Sergeant and Investigations Sergeant. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Minnesota and a master's degree in public safety administration from St. Mary's University. In his new role, Lt. Sackett supervises the Support Division.

Ron Henke was promoted to sergeant Sept. 30, 2017. Sgt. Henke has worked for the department since 2004 as a Patrol Officer, Commercial Vehicle Inspector, SWAT Team Member and Field Training Officer. Sgt. Henke earned an associate's degree in law enforcement from Alexandria Technical College.

Johnston has worked for the EPPD since 2004 and during his tenure has served as a Patrol Officer, Retail Crime Unit Officer, Explorer Post Advisor, Crisis Intervention Team Member, Training Unit Instructor, Crime Prevention Team Member and Field Training Officer. Sgt. Johnston earned an associate's degree from Central Lakes College in Brainerd.

Lt. Dave Becker is the commander of the **Patrol Division** which includes eight sergeants and 37 officers. There are eight Patrol Units as well as the secondary Airport, Crime Prevention, Crime Tech, Domestic Abuse Response Team (DART), Field Training, K-9, Reserve, Retail Crime, Traffic and SWAT units.





On Oct. 27, 2017, a group of community members came together to dedicate new K-9 equipment for the EPPD. The project started when the family of the late Dr. John Wright, the EPPD's first veterinarian, donated \$15,000 to the Eden Prairie Crime Prevention Fund.

After the department's K-9 officers identified the greatest need to be new agility training equipment, the department worked with the City's Senior Center to find wood shop volunteers to build it. After a generous donation of wood from Home Depot and 247 hours of volunteer labor, the equipment was finished.

Officer Chad Streiff was named to the Minnesota DWI All-Star Team by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety for achieving one of the highest number of DWI arrests in Minnesota in 2016. Officer Streiff made 76 DWI arrests that year. He was honored, along with the rest of the recipients, at a Twins game in June.







Officer Chris Fietek and Sgt. Jess Irmiter were each awarded a City Manager Quality Award which is given to employees who have performed at a high level of productivity and quality that regularly exceeds normal expectations.

Officer Bryan Dean was awarded the Officer of the Year Award by the department's Labor Management Team for his positive attitude, willingness to assist his partners and ability to keep calm during high pressure situations.

Investigations Division

In 2017 the **Investigations Division** was led by **Lt. Jim Morrow** until his retirement Sept. 30. At that time Lt. Bill Wyffels became the Investigations Lieutenant. This division consists of the Criminal Investigations, School Liaison and Special Investigations units. There are two sergeants, 13 officers and two full-time civilian employees in the Investigations Division.

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There were three homicides in Eden Prairie in 2017. The first two occurred May 25 when Nathan Lehman murdered his parents in their home. He was arrested within hours and was charged with two counts of second-degree murder.

The third homicide occurred June 16 when a 26-year-old woman died of a heroin overdose. The man who sold her the heroin, Timothy Holmes, was charged with homicide.

Investigators continue to work on the department's initiatives, including human trafficking and opioid addiction. EPPD investigators collaborate with law enforcement personnel from Bloomington, Richfield, Minnetonka, Plymouth and Maple Grove as part of the "494 Corridor Group," with the goal to investigate crimes related to human trafficking along Interstate 494. In 2017 that group conducted seven stings in the six member communities that resulted in 38 arrests and the recovery of 17 victims.



Eden Prairie saw a 425-percent increase in the number of opioid overdoses from 2016 to 2017. Last year 21 people overdosed on opioids and two of them died. Eleven of the 19 overdose survivors received naloxone, a nasal inhalant that reverses the effects of an overdose. We will continue to work hard on education and enforcement in order to decrease this number in 2018.

Det. Carter Staaf received the EPPD's first-ever **Chaplain Tim Power Award** at the department's annual award program in
November. The award honors the memory of **Father Tim Power**, who served as a Police and Fire Department Chaplain
for 24 years before his death in September 2016.

The award recognizes an employee who provides consistent care for people in the department and community, displays empathy when communicating with the public and fellow employees, demonstrates teamwork, and exhibits actions that are engaging and encourages people to share themselves.

Analyst Ryan Kapaun and Det. Travis Serafin received Commendation Awards from the St. Louis Park Police Department in May for their assistance with two drug overdose deaths in St. Louis Park that led to murder charges.

In June 2017, 152 soon-to-be 3rd-graders and their counselors took over Riley Lake Park for the annual **Safety Camp** hosted by the Police, Fire and Parks and Recreation departments.

Campers learned about a variety of topics, including water safety, personal safety, internet safety, bike safety, animal safety, fire safety and many others.







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Support Division



In 2017, the **Support Division** was led by **Lt. Bill Wyffels** until Oct. 1, when Lt. Matt Sackett assumed the position. The Support Division consists of the Records, Dispatch, Professional Development, Support Operations, Community Service/Animal Control, Licensing, Code Enforcement and Chaplain units. There are three sergeants, two supervisors and 24 civilians in the Support Division.

In 2017 the Support Division:

- Answered 46,319 calls in the Dispatch Center
- Processed 591 licenses
- Responded to 994 car lockout calls
- Processed 5,995 pieces of evidence
- Performed 298 fingerprint services
- Responded to 219 city ordinance violation calls
- Processed 8,077 records

Eden Prairie Police Department Reserves are adult volunteers who assist sworn officers by performing community service tasks and non-criminal police functions. Reserve officers also assist in natural disasters and other emergencies that require additional personnel. In addition, they help clean up Hwy. 5, serve as the City's Color Guard and are trained to provide basic emergency medical care.
