
Gerber earned a bachelor's degree in business management from Cardinal Stritch University and an Executive Fire Officer certification from the National Fire Academy.







2018 Market Value: \$10.2-billion



Statement of Net Position

This financial summary is a condensed view of the City's assets and liabilities for all funds as of Dec. 31, 2018. In 2018, assets exceeded liabilities by \$395-million. Of this amount, \$315-million is invested in capital assets, \$52-million is unrestricted and may be used to meet the City's ongoing obligations to residents and creditors, and \$28-million is restricted. The City is financially sound and maintained its net position for 2018.



ENTERPRISE FUNDS

Utilities

Eden Prairie's water, wastewater and stormwater utilities serve approximately 20,000 residential, commercial and industrial accounts. The City's water storage facilities have a capacity of 8.5-million gallons and are supplied by a system of 15 wells that are permitted to pump 28-million gallons per day.

Water Utility Financial Results

Water usage remained relatively flat at 2.3-billion gallons in 2018; however, an increase in rates resulted in a water utility revenue increase of \$575,647 for the year. Total operating expenses (excluding depreciation) were \$7,486,051 in 2018, which is 112% of the \$6,663,748 budgeted and \$807,644 more than 2017. The increase was primarily a result of the Dell Road Water Tower recoating project in 2018.




Wastewater Utility Financial Results

In 2018, wastewater revenue increased by 8.4%, a total of \$492,515. Total operating expenses (excluding depreciation) were \$5,705,790, which is 99.5% of the \$5,734,353 budgeted and \$571,576 more than 2017. Disposal charges are the largest expense, totaling \$4,186,455. Metropolitan Council Environmental Services establishes monthly disposal costs on a metrowide basis. For 2018, the disposal fee increased 4.7%.



Stormwater Utility Financial Results

In 2018, stormwater revenue increased by 14.5%, a total of \$346,205, due to a rate change. Total operating expenses (excluding depreciation) were \$1,254,125, which is 93.4% of the \$1,342,243 budgeted and \$109,805 less than 2017.



Municipal Liquor Store Operations

The City's three municipal liquor stores constitute one of the largest municipal off-sale operations in the State of Minnesota. **Eden Prairie Liquor** profits contribute to the financial well-being of the City by funding important capital projects. City leaders believe municipal-owned liquor operations help to protect the health and safety of youth by placing emphasis on preventing sales to underage people.

Overall liquor store sales totaled \$10,559,515 in 2018, a 2.7% increase from 2017; the City transferred \$800,000 in profits to the Capital Improvement Project fund, \$100,000 more than in 2017. Over the past 10 years, more than \$9-million in liquor store profits have funded various capital projects, including Riley Lake Park renovations, trail maintenance and the new Staring Lake Park pickleball courts.

Since 2003, **Moody's Investors Service** has assigned its highest rating, **Aaa**, to the City of Eden Prairie's bonds. In 2014, Eden Prairie secured a second **AAA** bond rating from **Standard and Poor's Financial Services.** Reasons for the consistent bond ratings include Eden Prairie's substantial and diversified tax base, strong financial operations, low debt burden, and strengths in flexibility with budget reserves, liquidity, management stability and financial policies.
